

FAIR BOARD. *In no event will the Fair Board be responsible for loss or damage that may occur; however, the Fair Board will take every reasonable precaution to prevent accident or loss. The Fair Board reserves the right to change any or all departments; and, reject or increase any or all Fair Board prizes.*

LIABILITY. *Each exhibitor will be solely responsible for any loss, injury or damage done to or occasioned by or arising from any articles or animals exhibited. All entries are accepted with the understanding that neither Owyhee County, its Fair or Extension Office shall be held responsible for any loss or damage that might befall any livestock, equipment, or any loss or damage occurring or done to another, or occasioned by, or arising from any animal or article owned or exhibited by him/her, and will protect and indemnify Owyhee County, its Fair or Extension Office against all legal or other proceedings. Owyhee County, its Fair or Extension Office is not liable for compensation to any exhibitor or their animals which have been disqualified at the show. The exhibitors shall hold Owyhee County, its Fair or Extension Office harmless and indemnify it against any legal proceedings thereto. Only on this condition are entries accepted. The Exhibitor accepts full responsibility for any damage, loss, or injury done by the animals exhibited or the exhibitor. Owyhee County, its Fair or Extension Office assumes no responsibility for loss or injury to exhibits; however, every precaution will be taken to insure the safety of entries. By his/her signature on the entry form, the exhibitor acknowledges and accepts these conditions.*

GENERAL YOUTH EXHIBITOR INFORMATION. The primary emphasis of youth participation in various exhibition and evaluation functions at the Fair is of an educational nature. As used in these rules, "youth" shall refer to both 4-H and FFA youth unless specifically defined as one or the other.

Code of Conduct. All Parents/Guardians, Volunteers, Advisors and 4-H/FFA Youth have signed and agreed to abide by the following Owyhee County Code of Conduct:

Idaho families and youth trust the University of Idaho Extension System to provide educational programs in a safe environment for all participants. The opportunity to participate in and/or work with Extension's Idaho 4-H Youth Development and FFA programs is a privilege and honor, not a right. Volunteers and Advisors are to be positive role models. Youth and parents/guardians are expected to demonstrate appropriate behavior at all times. This Code of Conduct has been established as the foundation for all individuals participating in University of Idaho Extension programs. This Code has been adopted by the Owyhee County Fair Board. All 4-H Youth Development and FFA program participants are expected to:

- Work with youth, families, volunteers and Extension personnel in a cooperative, courteous, respectful manner demonstrating good sportsmanship and behaviors appropriate for a positive role model.
- Accept supervision from Superintendents, the Fair Board, and Extension personnel regarding fair events/activities and cooperate with others. In addition, parents and youth will accept supervision from certified leaders and FFA

advisors.

- Maintain open, honest communication with members, leaders, parents and Extension personnel.
- Uphold every individual's right to dignity, appropriate self-expression and individual development.
- Refrain from verbal or physical abuse of others and report such abuse, if observed. Such action as conviction for child abuse or neglect, violent crimes, unethical behavior, substance abuse, verbal abuse, physical abuse, mismanagement of 4-H funds, or other serious offenses, will not be tolerated.
- Respect, adhere to, and enforce the rules, policies and guidelines established at the local and state levels for the 4-H Youth Development program, FFA Conduct Code and school district policies.
- Promote the spirit of inclusion and welcome participation of other individuals from all backgrounds. Comply with equal opportunity and anti-discrimination laws.
- Refrain from consuming alcoholic beverages, use of tobacco products and/or a controlled substance at 4-H events and activities. Being under the influence of alcohol or illegal drugs while in the presence of 4-H members at or during 4-H programs or activities is not acceptable.
- Inform Extension personnel of any incidents that may violate 4-H/FFA policies.
- Treat animals humanely and encourage all participants to provide appropriate and ethical animal care.
- Operate machinery, vehicles, and other equipment in a safe and responsible manner when working with youth and adult participants in 4-H Youth Development and FFA programs.
- Ensure that 4-H and FFA participants are not required to purchase materials, equipment, animals or services from any specific places of business.
- Comply with all applicable laws of the city, county, and state of residence and/or location of 4-H/FFA activity.
- Handle all concerns regarding local/area 4-H/FFA program management internally within the University of Idaho Extension system and/or the FFA chapter sponsoring school district.

Violating the Code of Conduct shall be grounds for action up to or including immediate removal from the 4-H/FFA activity/program, termination and removal from the fairgrounds for the duration of the Fair. Decisions regarding immediate removal, suspension or termination will be made by the Grievance Committee in cooperation with the local Extension office personnel with subsequent notification of and consultation with the District Director and State 4-H Director, and/or the FFA chapter sponsoring school district. Those who wish to appeal a decision may do so through the appeal process. *[The Code of Conduct for Parents/Guardians, Volunteers/Advisors and 4-H/FFA Youth MUST be signed at enrollment in order to participate. Electronic signature of acceptance when enrolling online constitutes acceptance and is also binding.]*

Chain of Communication. Youth → Parent/Guardian → Leader/Advisor → Superintendent → 4-H Program Coordinator/Extension Educator → Fair Grievance Committee comprised of one Extension Office member, one 4-H leader, one FFA advisor, one Fair Board member, and one Sale Committee member (if a

market project is involved).

Appeal Process. After following the Chain of Communication outlined above, all decisions of the Fair Grievance Committee are final.

Rule Compliance. Anyone failing to comply with the Owyhee County Youth Exhibitor Rules may be prohibited from participation in the Owyhee County Fair the following year.

Age is the age of the youth on January 1 of the current year. Classifications for youth exhibitors are defined as:

Cloverbuds	5-7 years
Junior 1	8-9 years
Junior 2	10-11 years
Intermediate	12-14 years
Senior	15-18 years

Project Record Book. In order for youth to show or sell, 4-H project record books must be completed, signed by the respective 4-H Leaders, and turned in at their interview evaluation prior to Fair. Record books of FFA members must be current as certified by their instructor.

Entries.

1. Fair entries are REQUIRED in order for 4-H or FFA youth to participate at Fair. No exceptions. Online entries open in mid-June and close at midnight on July 15. Paper entries will be accepted until 5:00 p.m. on July 15. There is a \$25 fee for paper entries, payable when entry form is submitted. There is no charge for online entries. There will be a link to the fair entry program on the Extension web page at www.owyheecounty.net/extension.
2. All youth exhibitors must be a member of an Owyhee County club or chapter and enrolled in 4-H or FFA when beginning and throughout the project to its completion.
3. All FCS and Miscellaneous Projects must be in place between noon and 8:00 pm on Tuesday.
4. All Livestock Projects are to be in place no later than 10:00 am, Wednesday, and remain in place and be maintained until 8:00 pm, Saturday — except for dog projects, cat projects, and underweight animals (see Auction Rule #11). If you need to bring your animal to the fairgrounds at a time other than during the posted animal check-in hours, contact your Superintendent **IN ADVANCE** of your arrival at the fairgrounds to see if arrangements can be made.
5. No animal is eligible to enter in both market and breeding stock classes.
6. Only one market animal of each species may be displayed and exhibited.
7. All youth enrolled in livestock projects must attend an Ethics Training before June 1, and must adhere to the Ethics Code they signed when they enrolled.
8. All livestock exhibitors must fit their own animals for show. Adults may **ASSIST, only if needed** (due to young age or inexperience of exhibitor).
9. Artificially changing the conformation for appearance of an animal for show is considered to be unethical and inhumane and is prohibited.

Dress. Clean long pants, preferably black. Dress shirt with sleeves, preferably white, short or long sleeved depending on project and judge, buttoned appropriately. No logos other than 4-H or FFA. No bare midriffs. No visible undergarments. Hats are allowed if required for a project (horse) or at judge's discretion. Appropriate closed toed shoes or boots for showing. No sandals allowed in

livestock or small animal barns. FFA to wear Official Dress per standards and judge's discretion.

COMPETITION is defined as "a contest supremacy between two or more animals, products or articles owned by separate exhibitors." Two exhibits made by the same person do NOT constitute competition. When a community interest in the ownership of animals or articles is apparent in the judgment of the board Superintendent, competition will be considered NOT to exist, although the actual ownership may be separate.

1. No awards will be made for Champion or Grand Champion where there is no competition.
2. Champion trophies and ribbons will be awarded where competition exists and where quality warrants such awards.
3. No market animal may be entered for competition more than one year.
4. Classes may be combined at the Judge's discretion.
5. All awards in the Livestock Department will be made on merit as determined by the judges' evaluation of each individual.

The decision of the judges will be final in determining awards.

Showmanship. All animal projects exhibited at the Owyhee County Fair must participate in Showmanship at the Owyhee County Fair.

Thank You Notes. Ensuring that the generous donations of trophy and award donors, and livestock sale buyers are acknowledged is of utmost importance. Youth **MUST** write thank you notes.

Superintendents. Display space, assignment of stall, barn management, and show order will be determined by the respective Superintendents. All exhibits, when assigned space, become subject to the control of the Department Superintendent.

MARKET LIVESTOCK EXHIBITOR INFORMATION. The Owyhee County Fair encourages a practical interest among youth in the responsibilities and practices of feeding and raising livestock. In order to foster fair competition, provide a level playing field and protect the safety of our food supply, exhibitors, parents/guardians and leaders/advisors are expected to adhere to the following rules.

Residency Requirement for Exhibit and Sale. To exhibit market livestock for sale at the Fair, one must be a 4-H or FFA member living in Owyhee County or attending a school located in Owyhee County. Non-residents of Owyhee County not attending an Owyhee County school, but attending a school in a school district located partly in Owyhee County, or living in the Jordan Valley school district, may petition for permission to participate in showing and marketing 4-H and FFA livestock at the Owyhee County Fair. Petitioners must be an active member of an Owyhee County 4-H club or school FFA chapter to be eligible for consideration. Petitioners must complete a request form and submit it **annually** no later than February 1 prior to the Fair. In the event petitions are approved, petitioners must continue to be an active member of an Owyhee County 4-H Club or FFA chapter and meet all project requirements. Even though initially approved,

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Petitioner may NOT show or sell at the Fair if: 1) The 4-H Leader or FFA advisor does not sign off that all requirements have been met and project is complete; or, 2) Petitioner is found to have provided false information. Approval of requests shall be granted or denied at the discretion of the Fair Board. Each year the Owyhee County Fair Board reserves the right to approve or deny petitions based on the space available at the fairgrounds. First priority will be given to Owyhee County residents, then those meeting the Boundary Exception requirements and, lastly, to those residing outside of Owyhee County who do not meet any of the Boundary Exception requirements. ALL DECISIONS OF THE FAIR BOARD ARE FINAL. The Fair Board will annually review and administer the boundary exception process.

Ownership. All sellers must have proof of ownership and brand inspection before they can go across the scale at weigh in. All animals must comply with Country of Origin Labeling (COOL) requirements. All breeding animals must be owned by the exhibitor. If purebred, registration papers must be in the name of the club member. You must show and sell the animal you initially weighed in except in the event of death and use of a "spare" animal. A Record Book must also be kept on each spare animal.

No Advertising. "For Sale" signs for any animal will not be allowed to be posted at any time.

TREATMENT AND CARE OF ANIMALS. All animals shall be handled in a proper and ethical manner in accordance with accepted modern animal husbandry and scientific practices. In addition, adequate care, including watering, feeding, and comfort, should be appropriately provided to all animals. All livestock pens and stalls must be kept clean and neat for the public to view each day during the fair. Any individual treating an animal in a manner deemed inappropriate will be asked to leave the grounds.

Exhibitors, their parents/guardians and leaders/advisors have a responsibility to follow animal health practices that are approved by the industry and the US Department of Agriculture to assure that the animal product customers are receiving is safe and wholesome food.

Substance Policy. Any drug, antibiotic or substance which may have been administered by the exhibitor or any other person must be done in strict compliance with the manufacturer's label requirements. The use of any non-approved substance or the improper use of approved substances is strictly prohibited.

All youth livestock exhibits must meet health and other project requirements rules and regulations. Any exhibitor who violates any rule or regulation will forfeit all privileges and premiums and be subject to such penalty as the management may order. Animals that have not met these standards will be the responsibility of the seller and will not be covered by the Owyhee County Junior Livestock insurance program.

LIVESTOCK HEALTH REQUIREMENTS

Basic Health Requirements for exhibiting ANY livestock at the Owyhee County Fair:

1. Animals must be sound, in good health, and free of any communicable diseases or parasites. All animals may be subject to inspection at the fairgrounds.
2. Livestock or poultry of any age or class showing clinical evidence of disease and/or parasites shall not be permitted to enter the fairgrounds. Any animal or fowl developing clinical evidence of disease after entering the fairgrounds may not show, and shall be subject to isolation or expulsion, depending on the nature and seriousness of the disease. In either case, the decision of the species superintendent and Extension personnel will prevail.
3. Out of state animals shall meet all requirements for entry into the state as established by the Idaho Department of Agriculture Department of Animal Health.
4. With the exception of meat goats, no animal with horns will be shown.
5. The owner of the animal is responsible for all veterinary calls and treatment for their animal. A list of "on call" veterinarians will be posted at the livestock barn.

Specific Health Requirements

1. **Horses.** Horses must be vaccinated for 4Way and Rhino. Evidence must be provided to club leader that these vaccinations were done within 90 days prior to Fair, but no earlier than May 15. It is strongly recommended that horses be vaccinated for West Nile Virus, and that the Coggins Test for EIA be administered.
2. **Cattle.** Female breeding animals older than 4 months of age must be inoculated for Brucellosis (Bangs). It is strongly recommended that breeding cattle be vaccinated 1 month before the Fair for IBR, BVD, BRSV, Lepto, PI-3 and Red Water.
3. **Swine.** It is strongly recommended that breeding swine be vaccinated for Erysipelas 15 days before the Fair. It is also recommended, that all breeding animals returned home be kept isolated from the rest of the herd for a period of 30 days. Additional requirements for all swine may be mandated by the Idaho State Veterinarian.
4. **Sheep and Goats.** Sheep shall be free from any evidence of Foot Rot, Blue Tongue, and Lip and Leg Ulcer. All female sheep and goats will be checked for Scrapies tags at check-in/weigh-in and that tag number will be recorded. Those without a Scrapies tag will be allowed to weigh in initially; however, these animals MUST have a Scrapies tag at final weigh-in or they will not be able to participate in the show or sale. *ADGA registered tattoo can be used.*
5. **Sheep.** Sheep Tail Docking Rules as noted in the Livestock Auction Rules must be followed.

SAFETY. Animals deemed to be unsafe will not be allowed to show with other animals.

1. Upon consultation with the leaders, parents, and Extension personnel, the Superintendent has the authority to deem an animal unsafe to show.
2. The Superintendent will provide a written explanation of his/her ruling.
3. The youth may appeal the decision of the Superintendent to the Grievance Committee.

AUCTION RULES

1. 4-H and FFA members may sell one animal (beef, sheep, swine, meat goat) at the Junior Livestock Sale, and are required to be present at the sale.
2. The Junior Livestock Sale is for Owyhee County exhibitors only. 4-H and FFA members carrying projects in other counties as well as Owyhee County will be allowed to sell a market animal at only one Fair.

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3. An adequate sale commission, not to exceed 4% for sheep, swine, and goat; and 3% for beef, to cover sale expenses and market animal death insurance will be deducted from the total sale price **and** add-on's of each animal sold.
4. **Sellers shall be responsible for feeding and watering their animal until removal from the fair grounds. Sellers MUST check out with their Superintendent. A \$25 fee will be assessed to those who do not leave their pen properly cleaned and/or do not check out with their Superintendent.**
5. Each 4-H or FFA member shall be required to carry a show stick, cane or (bat) for their beef or swine into the sale ring.
6. Animals receiving blue, red and white quality awards will be allowed to sell at auction.
7. Those animals not receiving floor bid will be sold at auction without a floor.
8. All animals will be sold at the judges' discretion.
9. **ONLY** animals meeting minimum weight requirements will be sold. Animals may be weighed as long as the scales are open. Cattle from distant parts of the county may be weighed prior to leaving the ranch for the fair. They must be weighed on a certified scale (the scale they weighed in on initially) and be accompanied by a signed weigh slip. **No animals will be re-weighed.**
10. Extra Animals - Ear tags will be removed from extra animals at weigh in. These animals are to be removed from the grounds by 10:00 am on Wednesday.
11. Underweight Animals - Ear tags on animals that are underweight will be changed at weigh in. These animals may stay on the grounds to participate in showmanship and feeder classes; however, they are required to be removed from the grounds Friday following the Livestock Judging Contest and no later than 10:00 p.m. Those living a great distance from the fairgrounds may keep their underweight animal at the fairgrounds as long as they are removed no later than Saturday night. NO underweight animals can be on the fairgrounds Sunday morning when sale animals are sorted for delivery to packers. **A completed Check Out Form is required to remove an animal from the grounds.** These forms are available from your Superintendent and need to be signed by the animal owner and their Superintendent.
12. Sheep and Swine - All sheep and swine must be weighed and in place by 10:00 am on Wednesday. This weight will be used as the sale weight. Swine may be checked in between 7:00 pm and 11:00 pm on Tuesday, and beginning at 6:00 am on Wednesday. **THE GATE TO THE FAIRGROUNDS WILL BE LOCKED BETWEEN 11:00 PM TUESDAY AND 6:00 AM ON WEDNESDAY. NO ANIMALS WILL BE RECEIVED DURING THOSE HOURS.**
13. Meat Goats must be weighed and in place by 10:00 am on Wednesday. No lead ropes or collars of any kind may be worn on the scale. This weight will be used as the sale weight.
14. Sheep -
 - a. Sheep must be slick shorn within 7 days prior to the final weigh-in at Fair.
 - b. No lead ropes or collars of any kind may be worn on the scale.
 - c. Idaho State 4-H Policies and Procedures Guidelines endorses the American Veterinary Medical Association recommendation that all lambs must be docked no shorter than the distal end of the caudal fold. Lambs docked in this manner will have an approximate tail length of 1.25 inches at the time of weaning.
 - d. Any sheep that exhibits a prolapse during the Owyhee County Fair will be ineligible for exhibit or sale and, upon notification by Extension personnel or the Sheep Superintendent, be immediately removed from the fairgrounds.
15. Beef - Beef animals will be weighed at designated times and locations.
16. Livestock Sale Procedure
 - a. The Sale Committee will set a per head floor price for each animal based on the packer's carcass bid, estimated grade, yield, and dressing percent.
 - b. Buyers will pay full sale price for non re-sale and the difference between floor price and live sale price for re-sale animals.
 - c. Kill charges will be paid by the buyer.
 - d. Should any carcass be condemned, member will receive the amount of original live value at the time of initial weigh in.
 - e. Monies received from the sale on Owyhee Cattlemen's Association sponsored calves will be divided 2/3 to the youth and 1/3 to the OCA member who sponsored the calf.
17. Order of Sale - Grand and Reserve Champion Quality will sell first and second, followed by all blue ribbon, then red ribbon, then white ribbon animals.
18. Buyer Certificates. Buyer certificates will be available from the Extension Office upon request, and available on our website. Youth must provide their own photo. It is optional for individuals or clubs to provide frames (8 1/2 x 11) for the certificates. Youth are responsible to deliver their thank you and buyer certificate to the buyer after the auction.
19. During the Sale. In order to keep the sale moving in a timely manner and to allow buyers to concentrate on the sale, no buyer gifts may be brought into the sale ring or distributed during the auction. Only ribbons and trophies associated with the market animal project are allowed in the sale ring.
20. All sales and shipping arrangements for market animals not going through the official Junior Livestock Sale Auction are the responsibility of the owner. The Junior Livestock Sale Committee cannot make personal sale or shipping arrangements.
21. Payment Checks will be mailed on or about September 15. **Please DO NOT CALL before September 15.**



3. Flat amount (add-on) — designate an amount of support for a child.



BEEF PRODUCTION AWARD PROGRAM

This award program is offered as an incentive for members to select top quality cattle that have growth potential, show good muscling, exhibit trimness, and that are correct in structure. It also encourages proper management in the care and feeding of the selected animal to achieve high levels of production. In this way it provides a "real world" industry view of beef production. It is based on "Standards of Excellence" set and followed within the industry and emphasizes that the consumer must be satisfied with the finished product.

- ⇒ A Gold Standard Certificate is awarded to members who meet all industry standards with their animal.
- ⇒ A Silver Standard Certificate is awarded to members who meet all but one industry standard with their animal.
- ⇒ A White Standard Certificate is awarded to all other participants.

Only animals meeting all market standards of excellence will be eligible for production award monies.

Market Standards of Excellence:

1. USDA Quality grade of Choice minus or better.
2. Hot carcass weight of 550 to 950 lb.
3. Minimum 57% dressed on straight live weight
4. Minimum Average Daily Gain of 2.8 lb. per day.
5. Maximum USDA Yield Grade of 3.20

WESTERN STATES ANGUS AUXILIARY AWARD

The Western States Angus Auxiliary, 1150 East 2600 South, Hagerman, Idaho 83332, will present an award to the outstanding 4-H exhibitor and/or outstanding FFA exhibitor. The selection of the winner is based on show ring placing of individual animals, placing in showmanship and education display. The following point system must be followed:

Conformation point placing: Grand Champion: 40, Reserve Champion: 30, 1st place: 20, 2nd place: 15, 3rd place: 10.

Showmanship: participation: 6.

Educational display promoting the Angus breed: 25.

If steers and breeding animals are both exhibited, points may be combined to select a winner.

For breeding animals, the animal must be registered with papers. This is open to exhibitors with one or more breeding and/or market animals. Winning the award in previous years shall not exclude an exhibitor from winning again. For market steers, this award should go to the highest placing predominately black steer; the sire must be Angus.





Division 1602: Obedience

Obedience Classes: will be judged on the ability of the exhibitor to have their dog perform a series of exercises for each class. The judge will award points based on the exhibitor's ability to complete each exercise. All obedience dogs must wear a properly fitted collar or training collar, being defined as either a flat collar or a slip collar of either chain or fabric with one ring at each end. All members competing in obedience must use a 6 foot leather or fabric lead. 1) **Sub-Novice.** Heel on lead; right, left and about turns; automatic sits; figure eight; stand for examination; recall, long sit (1 minute), long down (3 minutes) and grooming of dog and handler. 2) **Novice.** Heel on and off lead; right, left and about turns; automatic sits; figure eight; stand for examination; recall, long sit (1 minute), long down (3 minutes). 3) **Graduate Novice.** Heel on and off lead; right, left and about turns; automatic sits; figure eight off lead; stand for examination off lead; drop on recall; long sit (3 minutes with handler out of sight), long down (5 minutes with handler out of sight). 4) **Open.** Heel off lead; right, left and about turns; automatic sits; figure eight off lead; drop on recall; retrieve on flat; retrieve over high jump; broad jump; long sit (3 minutes with handler out of sight), long down (5 minutes with handler out of sight). Note: Classes may be combined at the discretion of the Judge or Superintendent.

RULES

1. All dogs will be brought in and taken home the day of the show.
2. All dogs exhibited must be crated or on a leash at all times, and kept in the dog exhibit area. No dogs are to be left unattended.
2. All general and livestock rules apply to this department.
3. Youth must exhibit dog in fitting and showing.
4. Bitches in season must be reported to superintendent and judge and may be shown in fitting and showing at the discretion of the judge. The judge must remove from competition any dog that: 1) is not kept under control by its handler; 2) any handler who interferes willfully with another competitor or his dog; or 3) any handler who abuses his dog in the ring. If a dog or handler is expelled or excused by a judge, the reason shall be stated in the judge's book or in a separate report.
5. A chain collar "choke" is permitted; however, a show lead and collar is preferred.
6. Class entered and rate of progression through the classes can vary at the discretion of the leader.
7. Dogs must be current on recommended and/or required vaccinations.

HERDSMANSHIP, for both large and small animals, will be judged Wednesday, Thursday and Friday. A cash award will be given to the club with the highest overall 3-day score for each the large animals and the small animals (judged separately). Awards will be given to the highest scoring club in each remaining species. Daily winners in each species will be awarded a bucket of candy and traveling plaque. Judging will be based upon cleanliness, neatness, educational displays, decoration, and exhibitor attendance at stalls. The purpose of this contest is to encourage exhibitors to care for their animals and equipment properly, to keep pens and stalls clean, and to present a pleasing and educational exhibit to the general public.

GUIDELINES FOR HERDSMANSHIP

- ◆ Animals and pens are to be kept clean. Animals are to have fresh water and feed whenever needed or on feeding schedule.
- ◆ Beef and Dairy animals should be tied correctly with a halter and a neck rope (Not neck chain. If an animal gets in trouble there is no way to cut a chain.)
- ◆ Wheelbarrows, brooms, rakes, shovels, and other equipment should be stored safely in equipment boxes and designated areas. Equipment and trash should be kept out of walkway.
- ◆ Small clubs/chapters (4 members or less) may join together for barn duty with other clubs in the same barn. Clubs/chapters need to inform barn superintendent of combinations.
- ◆ Educational material must be displayed. It is important as representatives of the livestock industry to help educate the general public to the importance and value of the livestock industry.
- ◆ Decorations are to be neat and attractive but need not be fancy or expensive.
- ◆ Exhibitors should be friendly and courteous to the public. They should be ready and willing to answer questions or discuss their project. When on duty exhibitor should present a clean, neat appearance.
- ◆ Herdsmanship hours will be from 10:00 a.m. – 6:00 p.m. each day. Members are excused from being judged for herdsmanship during their species' show times. At least one exhibitor from each club/chapter (no parents) should be on duty at all times during these hours.
- ◆ With the exception of horses, no riding or sitting on animals.
- ◆ **NO** water fights in barn, stalls, or bathroom area.
- ◆ **Stall cards are REQUIRED.**
- ◆ All projects and decorations are to be maintained and remain in place until 6:00 p.m. on Saturday.

Cloverbud Exhibits at Fair. Fair exhibits by Cloverbuds are non-competitive and are optional. Exhibits are an opportunity to show what they have accomplished. A Cloverbud may exhibit their Activity Book and/or project at Fair, but are not required to do so. A participation ribbon or similar recognition will be awarded.

Activity Book Interviews. If a Cloverbud would like to experience an oral interview and discuss their completed activity with a judge, they are most welcomed to do so. These interviews are held just prior to Fair. Cloverbuds will need to sign up for an interview time in the same manner as the older 4-H participants. After the interview they will leave their Activity Book with the judge and it will be added to their club's display at Fair. A participation ribbon or similar recognition will be awarded.

Fair Entries. If your Cloverbud would like to display their project or projects at the Fair, please submit their fair entries online in the same manner as the older 4-H and FFA members. This helps in the planning of display space for their club, and insures that we will have enough participation ribbons for the Cloverbud Department. ALL CLOVERBUD ENTRIES SHOULD BE SUBMITTED IN THE CLOVERBUD DEPARTMENT.
The deadline for fair entries is July 15 at midnight.

CLOVERBUD PROGRAM GUIDELINES & POLICIES

The Idaho 4-H Cloverbud Program is offered for boys and girls who are 5 years old by January 1 of the current 4-H year.

Project Participation. Cloverbud members may be involved in non-animal, or lap animal activities. Lap animals are defined as: rabbits, cavies, cats, small dogs that weigh less than the member, chickens and mini-goats. Cloverbuds may not be involved in large animal projects, competitive situations, and projects involving firearms or motorized vehicles. 4-H insurance policies, including the University of Idaho liability coverage for volunteers, will not cover youth or adults working with youth under the age of 8, involved in these activities.

County Oral Presentations. Cloverbuds are welcomed and encouraged to participate in the County Oral Presentation Contest, typically held at the end of May. Participation ribbons are awarded for their efforts as they begin to learn about public speaking and presentations.

All regularly enrolled members of an Owyhee County 4-H club may enter the Oral Presentation Contest by presenting a demonstration, illustrated talk, TV commercial, dramatic reading, or speech. Each of these will receive ribbon awards (blue, red or white). In addition, the awards will be given to the top presenter in each age category at the Owyhee County Fair on 4-H Awards Night. County Oral Presentation participation will be considered in selecting major award winners.

Oral Presentations could be any of the following:

1. A **Demonstration** is doing and explaining. It is showing how. In a demonstration you make something or do something. (There may be an end product, for example, a salad.)
2. An **Illustrated Talk** is talking. It is telling how. In an illustrated talk you show pictures, charts, models, equipment, and other types of visual aids.
3. **Dramatic Reading**. Words and actions are used to present material to either entertain or educate. The presenter may write their own material or use published material. Costume, make-up or props are required. The presentation may be memorized.
4. A **TV Commercial** is a presentation to convince an audience to buy an idea or product. You may use illustrations or objects as long as name brands are concealed. Include the introduction, body, and summary.
5. A **Speech** is presenting a topic with only spoken word and gestures. It does not include visual aids. Note cards only may be used.

Any requests for technology equipment must be made well in advance. No accommodations can be made the day of the contest at the site.

Awards will be given for the Top Overall Presentation and Reserve Overall Presentation in each of the Junior 1, Junior 2, Intermediate and Senior divisions in the Ag Division and in the FCS/Miscellaneous Division.





DEPARTMENT GUIDELINES AND RULES
FAMILY & CONSUMER SCIENCES (FCS) AND MISCELLANEOUS

Please review carefully prior to your Record Book Interview and Fair

1. All record books and project items, with the exception of decorated cakes, should be turned in at record book interview evaluations prior to Fair. Decorated cakes only may be brought to Fair on Wednesday at 8:00 a.m. for judging.
2. Judging will be completed between 8:00 a.m. and 2:00 p.m. on Wednesday.
3. Exhibits, once assigned space, become subject to the control of the department superintendent.
4. 4-H FCS and Miscellaneous exhibits are to meet the minimum requirements for 4-H as well as comply with the rules and regulations governing the Owyhee County Fair.
5. Any exhibitor who violates any of the rules and regulations will forfeit all privileges and be subject to such penalty as the management may assign.
6. Under no circumstances are project record books to be removed until checkout time.
7. 4-H superintendents will rely on the signatures of the 4-H leader and parents as a certification that the record book is complete and the exhibit is ready to be judged. A project demonstration is also required. The 4-H member, leader and parent must sign all record books. Exhibits will not receive an award if the record book is not signed.
8. The involvement report and story is a part of the 4-H exhibit with the project book and record book.
9. 4-H Secretary's Book, Treasurer's Book and Club Scrapbook are to be exhibited in the appropriate class.
10. Maximum size for posters and displays are located in project requirements.
11. All members must do a demonstration for each project to be complete.
12. **Preparation of clothing and sewn exhibits:**
 - a. Garments that have been worn should be carefully laundered or cleaned and pressed before exhibiting.
 - b. All sewn projects, including quilts, are to be brought on hangers (supplied by member).
 - c. Each garment must be labeled with the name, age, club and project name. This label should be pinned or attached onto the bottom hem.
 - d. Only accessories made to complete project requirements are to be exhibited in any department of the clothing project.
 - e. Please label and pin or attach the label to ALL sewing projects
13. **Preparation of foods exhibits:**
 - a. Food exhibited should be placed on a disposable plate and covered with a new clear plastic zip lock bag. NO PLASTIC WRAP!
 - b. A label with name, age, club and project name should be attached to the exhibit.
 - c. Recipes and their source MUST be included with food items.
 - d. Canning exhibits should also include contents of the jar, method of canning (hot pack or pressure), processing time on a label attached to the bottom of the jar. All tomato products must have the addition of acid (lemon juice) to be considered a safe product. Call the FCS Extension Educator for updates on food preservation.
 - e. If a frozen or perishable (dairy, soup, etc.) item is part of your project, bring it to your record book interview to be judged, then provide a poster/photos for exhibit at Fair.
14. Displays should meet project requirements.
