

FAIRGROUND RULES

- 1. Due to insurance regulations, <u>NO DOGS OR BICYCLES</u> are allowed on the Fairgrounds. The only exceptions to this would be:
 - a. 4-H project dogs will be allowed on the Fairgrounds on Thursday afternoon ONLY for the Dog Show and for the Small Animal Round Robin. These dogs must be on a leash or crated at all times except during "off leash" events in the Dog Show, and must be removed from the Fairgrounds following the Small Animal Round Robin.
 - Campers who are found with dogs on the fairgrounds or at their campsite will lose their camping privileges.
- 2. NO WATER FIGHTS in barns or bathroom areas.
- 3. Permits Any individual or group intending to solicit or demonstrate at the Owyhee County Fair for the purpose of raising money, recruiting membership, promoting ideas or ideals, or for any other purpose which initiates contact with the public on the fair grounds, is required to have a solicitation permit for any such activity. Permits may be applied for with the Fair Board including any limitations deemed appropriate. A minimum fee of \$50 will be required of each applicant for use of the fair grounds with additional daily fees appropriate to the proposed use activity.
- 4. NO PARKING inside the Fairgrounds at any time! This includes all booth vendors as well as 4-H & FFA leaders, members, parents, and spectators. Loading and unloading will be allowed, but please move your vehicle to one of our 2 large parking lots as soon as possible.
- 5. Alcohol is allowed in designated areas ONLY!
- 6. All youth must be supervised by an adult at all times while on the grounds.

DIRECTIONS: The Owyhee County fairgrounds in Homedale, is located off Highway 95, on the banks of the Snake River. At the 4-way Stop in the middle of town, go west on Idaho Avenue for 3 blocks. You can't miss our sign directing you north. Just follow the signs — about seven blocks. There are two big parking lots.



Open Class Departments


- 1. <u>How To Enter Open Class Exhibits</u>. Exhibits are to be entered in assigned areas with the appropriate superintendent. The exhibitor will be given a duplicate tag. The tag must be presented at Check Out. No early Check Out will be allowed. Only enter your items in the Exhibit Hall if you are willing to leave them until Check-Out.
- 2. <u>Eligibility</u>. Entering items into Open Class is open to everyone. All ages and residents of any county are eligible.
- 3. <u>ALL Entries will be received</u> on Tuesday, from 3:00pm until 8:00 pm in the Exhibit Hall at the Fairgrounds, including flowers, leafy vegetables, sugar beets, corn on the cob, berries, perishables, and pies.
- 4. Release and Removal of Entries. Open class entries will be released on Saturday from 6:00 p.m. —8:00 p.m. and Sunday from 9:00 am until 11:00 am in the Exhibit Hall at the Fairgrounds. Exhibitors must present their claim tickets to the superintendent or clerk in charge of the various departments before removing exhibits. Exhibits will not be released before 6:00 pm on Saturday. This rule will be strictly enforced.
- 5. Entries previously shown at the Owyhee County Fair will not be accepted.
- 6. <u>Authority of Superintendents</u>. All exhibits are subject to the control of the Department Superintendent. They are authorized to accept entries not listed in the exhibitor book if there is space and if they judge the entry to be worthy. Department Superintendents also may, at their discretion, combine entries to create appropriate classes/categories.
- 7. Exhibitors may make only one entry in each lot, except as specified in the special rules of each department.
- 8. <u>Premiums</u>. In order for premiums to be awarded, there must be three or more exhibits in that category. Every entry receives a ribbon but not all entries receive a premium. First and second place winners in each category receive premiums. Division winners and department winners also receive premiums.
- 9. <u>Premium Pay Out.</u> Open Class premiums will be paid out on Saturday 6:00 p.m.—8:00 p.m. and Sunday, 9:00-11:00 am. All exhibits must stay in place until 6:00 pm on Saturday. <u>Premium money not claimed within one week of the closing of the Fair will be reverted back to the Fair.</u>
- 10. <u>Unclaimed Exhibits</u>. Exhibits not claimed within one week after the close of Fair will be considered abandoned and be disposed of as the Fair Board sees fit.

Your entry in our Fair is very important. If you are unsure as to the procedures, please call the Fair Office, 337-3888 or 941-4522, and we'll be glad to help!

The owner or custodian of property of any kind brought to the fairgrounds either for exhibit or for other purposes assumes, as a condition of its admission to the fairgrounds, all risk of and responsibility for loss, damages or theft. Exhibitors exempt the Owyhee County Fair; its officers, directors, employees & volunteers from liability of any loss or damage of their property and shall indemnify the said Owyhee County Fair against all claims or damages.

<u>Professional entries will receive ribbons only.</u>

- 1. All produce shown in this department must have been grown by the exhibitor.
- 2. All grains, corn, grasses and legumes must have been grown in plots of 1/2 acre or more to be eligible for exhibit. No premiums will be awarded unless produce is grown in the current year, except corn and grass seeds, which may have been grown during the previous year.
- 3. Entries are limited to 1 entry in each class for each exhibitor.
- 4. Blemished produce will be discounted by the judge. Exhibitors may replace damaged produce at anytime, except when being judged.
- 5. The Superintendent shall have the right to refuse any entry which is found to contain insects or is otherwise unsuitable for display. The Superintendent shall have the right to remove any time after judging any produce which has become unsightly.
- 6. Special Department Display Only
- 7. All produce must be clean prior to entry.

SECTION A: BEANS AND PEAS

Classes:

- 1. Beans, green bush, wax or pole variety, 7 specimen in pods.
- 2. Peas, any variety, 7 specimens in pods

SECTION B: BROCCOLI AND CAULIFLOWER Classes:

- 1. Broccoli, 1 head. Cut close at bottom
- 2. Cauliflower, any variety, 1 head. Cut close at bottom.

SECTION C: CABBAGE AND LETTUCE Classes:

- 1. Cabbage, any variety, 1 head. Cut close to bottom. Must be solid. Peel off outer leaves.
- 2. Lettuce, any variety, 2 heads. Cut close to bottom. Must be solid. Peel off outer leaves

SECTION D: CORN

Classes

1. Corn (roasting ears) best 1 ear. Leave 1/2 in. stem at butt. Remove husks, do not trim top.

SECTION E: CUCUMBERS

1. Cucumber, (must have stems) 3 specimens.

- 1. Peppers, hot any variety, 3 specimens (must have stems)

Classes:

- 1. Cherry Tomatoes, red, 3 specimens. Stems must be left on.

SECTION J: ONIONS

Classes:

Onions, any variety, 3 specimens. Leave roots on and 1 in. tops. Remove peeling only to cleaning, no hand picking necessary clean.

SECTION K: POTATOES:

Classes:

Potatoes, any variety, 3 specimens. May be washed or brushed with soft brush.

SECTION L: OTHER ROOTED VEGETABLES Classes:

- Radishes, any variety, 5 specimens, leave 1 in. top and tails on. May be washed or brushed with soft brush.
- 2. Carrots, any table variety, 5 specimens. Leave tails on, and 1 in. of tops. May be washed or brushed with soft brush.
- 3. Beets, any table variety, 3 specimens, leave 1 in. of top and tails on. May be washed or brushed with soft brush.
- 4. Turnips, any table variety, 1 specimen, leave 1 in. of top and tail. May be washed with soft brush.

SECTION M: OTHER VEGETABLES Classes:

- 1. Rhubarb, any variety, 5 specimens. May be washed or brushed with soft brush.
- 2. Eggplant, any variety, 1 specimen (must have stems).







- 1. Horticulture entries must be grown by the exhibitor.
- 2. Preference to named specimens.
- 3. Judges consider the stem, the cleanliness and freshness of foliage and flowers in judging.
- 4. Any cut horticulture material must be displayed in clear glass jars provided by the exhibitor. Leaves below the water line on stems should be removed.
- 5. All containers and vases should be marked underneath with owner's name. The fair is not responsible for lost or broken containers.
- 6. Exhibitors are encouraged to change any wilted flowers or materials during fair.
- 7. Exhibits must be in place by 10:00 am, Wednesday. Please come early.





Fair Board. In no event will the Fair Board be responsible for loss or damage that may occur; however, the Fair Board will take every reasonable precaution to prevent accident or loss. The Fair Board reserves the right to change any or all departments; and, reject or increase any or all Fair Board prizes.

<u>Liability</u>. Each exhibitor will be solely responsible for any loss, injury or damage done to or occasioned by or arising from any articles or animals exhibited. All entries are accepted with the understanding that neither Owyhee County, its Fair or Extension Office shall be held responsible for any loss or damage that might befall any livestock, equipment, or any loss or damage occurring or done to another, or occasioned by, or arising from any animal or article owned or exhibited by him/her, and will protect and indemnify Owyhee County, its Fair or Extension Office against all legal or other proceedings. Owyhee County, its Fair or Extension Office is not liable for compensation to any exhibitor or their animals which have been disqualified at the show. The exhibitors shall hold Owyhee County, its Fair or Extension Office harmless and indemnify it against any legal proceedings thereto. Only on this condition are entries accepted. The Exhibitor accepts full responsibility for any damage, loss, or injury done by the animals exhibited or the exhibitor. Owyhee County, its Fair or Extension Office assumes no responsibility for loss or injury to exhibits; however, every precaution will be taken to ensure the safety of entries. By his/her signature on the entry form, the exhibitor acknowledges and accepts these conditions.

<u>General Youth Exhibitor Information.</u> The primary emphasis of youth participation in various exhibition and evaluation functions at the Fair is of an educational nature. As used in these rules, "youth" shall refer to both 4-H and FFA youth unless specifically defined as one or the other.

<u>Code Of Conduct.</u> All Parents/Guardians, Volunteers, Advisors and Youth have agreed to abide by the following Code of Conduct:

Code of Conduct For Parents, Volunteers, And Youth Within The Idaho 4-H Youth Development Program Idaho families and youth trust the University of Idaho Extension system to provide educational programs in a safe environment for all participants. The opportunity to participate in and/or work with University of Idaho Extension's 4-H Youth Development program is a privilege and honor, not a right. Volunteers are to be positive role models. Youth and parents/guardians are expected to demonstrate appropriate behavior at all times. The following Code of Conduct has been established as the foundation for all individuals participating in University of Idaho Extension programs. All University of Idaho 4-H Youth Development program participants are expected to:

- Work with youth, families, volunteers, and Extension personnel in a cooperative, courteous, respectful manner demonstrating good sportsmanship and behaviors appropriate for a positive role model.
- Accept supervision from Extension personnel and cooperate with others; in addition, parents and youth will accept supervision from certified organizational and project volunteers.
- Maintain open, honest communication with members, volunteers, parents, and Extension personnel.
- Uphold every individual's right to dignity, appropriate self-expression, and individual development.
- Refrain from verbal, physical or emotional abuse of others (via bullying, texting, social media, etc.) and
 report such abuse, if observed. Any actions, such as a conviction for child abuse or neglect, violent crimes,
 unethical behavior, substance abuse, verbal abuse, physical abuse, mismanagement of 4-H funds, or other
 serious offenses will not be tolerated.
- Respect, adhere to and enforce the rules, policies, and guidelines established at the county and state levels for the 4-H Youth Development Program.
- Promote the spirit of inclusion and welcome participation of other individuals from all backgrounds. Comply with equal opportunity and anti-discrimination laws.
- The consumption of alcoholic beverages, use of tobacco products or an illegal controlled substance at 4-H youth events is prohibited.
- Inform Extension personnel of any incidents that may violate 4-H policies.
- Treat animals humanely and encourage all participants to provide appropriate and ethical animal care.
- Operate machinery, vehicles, and other equipment in a safe and responsible manner when working with youth and adults participating in 4-H Youth Development programs.
- Ensure that 4-H participants are not required to purchase materials, equipment, animals, or services from any specific places of business.
- Comply with all applicable laws of the city, county, and state of residence and/or location of 4-H activity.

• Handle all concerns regarding county/area 4-H program management internally within the University of Idaho Extension system.

Violating the Code of Conduct shall be grounds for action up to or including immediate removal from the 4-H activity/program and termination. Decisions regarding immediate removal, suspension or termination will be made by the county 4-H Professional with subsequent notification of and consultation with the District Director and State 4-H Youth Development Director. Volunteers who wish to appeal a decision may do so through the Appeal Process.

[The Code of Conduct for Parents/Guardians, Volunteers and Youth is signed at 4-H enrollment and during fair entry submission in order to participate. Electronic signature of acceptance when enrolling online constitutes acceptance and is binding. The Owyhee County Fair Board has adopted this Code of Conduct. It is implied that where only "volunteers" and "4-H" are mentioned, that "Advisors" and "FFA" are included.]

Rule Compliance. Anyone failing to comply with the Owyhee County Youth Exhibitor Rules may be prohibited from participation in the Owyhee County Fair the following year. A rule is defined as an established guide or regulation for action, conduct, method, or arrangement. A grievance is defined as a circumstance or condition thought to be unjust and grounds against a wrong, real, or imagined, inflicting injury or hardship. A rule violation is NOT a grievance and cannot be brought to the Grievance Committee. Each family is ultimately responsible for reviewing and following the rules as they pertain to their child or children. If you want to propose a change to a rule you may do so for the following year at the Post-Fair Meeting. Once the rules are approved by the Fair Board, Livestock Sale Committee, Leaders/Advisors, and Extension Office, they are in place for the entire year. The only exception would be for rare, unforeseen circumstances such as an animal health directive.

<u>Chain of Communication at Fair.</u> Youth \rightarrow Parent/Guardian \rightarrow Leader/Advisor \rightarrow Superintendent \rightarrow 4-H Program Coordinator/Extension Educator \rightarrow Fair Grievance Committee comprised of one Extension Office member, one 4-H leader, one FFA advisor, one Fair Board member, and one Sale Committee member (if a market project is involved).

<u>Appeal Process.</u> After following the Chain of Communication outlined above, all decisions of the Fair Grievance Committee are final.

<u>Age.</u> Age is the age of the youth on January 1 of the current year. Classifications for youth exhibitors are defined as: Cloverbud, 5-7 years; Junior, 8-10 years; Intermediate, 11-13 years; and, Senior, 14-18 years.

<u>Project Record Book.</u> In order for youth to show or sell, 4-H project record books must be completed, signed by the respective 4-H Leaders, and turned in at their interview evaluation prior to Fair. A Record Book must also be kept on each spare animal. If any record book is found incomplete, at the Judge's discretion, a white ribbon will, most likely, be awarded. If the member's incomplete record book is returned to them, they will have until 5:00 p.m. on the Monday following Record Book Interview Evaluations to return the record book to the Owyhee County Extension Office in order to still be eligible to show the project at Fair and, if it is a market livestock project, participate in the Junior Livestock Sale. Record books of FFA members must be current as certified by their advisor.

Entries.

- 1. Fair entries are REQUIRED in order for 4-H and FFA youth to participate at Fair. No exceptions. Online entries open June 15 and close at midnight on July 15. There is no charge for online entries. All youth exhibitors must be a member of an Owyhee County club or chapter and enrolled in 4-H or FFA when beginning and throughout the project to its completion.
- 2. With the exception of sheep and goat projects, that must be in place by 8:00 p.m. on Tuesday, all livestock projects are to be in place no later than 10:00 a.m., Wednesday, and remain in place and be maintained until animal leaves the fairgrounds except for dog projects, cat projects, and underweight animals (see Auction Rules 5 and 11).
- 3. No animal is eligible to enter in both market and breeding stock classes.
- 4. Only one market animal of each species may be displayed and exhibited.
- 5. Entries in all animal classes will be limited to one entry per exhibitor per class.
- 6. All youth enrolled in livestock projects must attend an Ethics Training before July 15, and must adhere to the Ethics Code they signed when they enrolled.
- 7. All livestock exhibitors must fit their own animals for show. Adults may ASSIST, only if needed (due to young age or inexperience of exhibitor).

8. Artificially changing the conformation or appearance of an animal for show is considered to be unethical and inhumane and is prohibited.

<u>Dress.</u> Clean long pants, preferably black. Dress shirt with sleeves, preferably white, short or long sleeved depending on project and judge, buttoned appropriately. No logos other than 4-H or FFA. No bare midriffs. No visible undergarments. Hats are allowed if required for a project (horse showmanship) or at judge's discretion. Appropriate closed toed shoes or boots for showing. No sandals allowed in livestock or small animal barns. FFA members are to wear Official Dress per standards or approved chapter showing attire.

<u>Competition.</u> Competition is defined as "a contest supremacy between two or more animals, products or articles owned by separate exhibitors." Two exhibits made by the same person do NOT constitute competition. When a community interest in the ownership of animals or articles is apparent in the judgment of the board Superintendent, competition will be considered NOT to exist, although the actual ownership may be separate.

- 1. No awards will be made for Champion or Grand Champion where there is no competition.
- 2. Champion trophies and ribbons will be awarded where competition exists and where quality warrants such awards.
- 3. No market animal may be entered for competition more than one year.
- 4. Classes may be combined at the Judge's discretion.
- 5. All awards in the Livestock Department will be made on merit as determined by the judges' evaluation of each individual. The decision of the judges will be final in determining awards.

<u>Showmanship.</u> All Youth exhibiting animal projects at the Owyhee County Fair must participate in Showmanship at the Owyhee County Fair. Animals used for showmanship must be entered in a 4-H/FFA market/quality or breeding class. Animals shown must be recognized as the member's own animal by 4-H/FFA.

<u>Thank You Notes</u>. Ensuring that the generous donations of trophy and award donors and livestock sale buyers are acknowledged is of utmost importance. Youth MUST write thank you notes.

<u>Superintendents.</u> Display space, assignment of stalls, barn management, and show order will be determined by the respective Superintendents. All exhibits, when assigned space, become subject to the control of the Department Superintendent.

<u>Livestock Exhibitor Information</u>. The Owyhee County Fair encourages a practical interest among youth in the responsibilities and practices of feeding and raising livestock. In order to foster fair competition, provide a level playing field and protect the safety of our food supply, exhibitors, parents/guardians, and leaders/advisors are expected to adhere to the following rules. All cattle must be completely halter broke and be able to be led safely. Uncontrollable animals will be removed from the fairgrounds.

<u>Ownership.</u> All sellers must have proof of ownership and brand inspection before they can go across the scale at weigh-in. All breeding animals must be owned by the exhibitor. If purebred, registration papers must be in the name of the club member. Youth must show and sell the animal they initially weighed-in except in the event of death and use of a spare animal. A Record Book must also be kept on each spare animal.

No Advertising. "For Sale" signs for any animal will not be allowed to be posted at any time.

Treatment and Care of Animals. All animals shall be handled in a proper and ethical manner in accordance with accepted modern animal husbandry and scientific practices. In addition, exhibitors are required to attend to their animals while on exhibit. Exhibitors must provide adequate care, including watering and feeding by 9:00 a.m. each day. Pens will also be checked throughout the day to ensure that food, water, and comfort are appropriately provided for all animals throughout the fair. All livestock pens and stalls must be kept clean and neat for the public to view each day during the fair. Any individual treating an animal in a manner deemed inappropriate will be asked to leave the grounds. Exhibitors, their parents/guardians, and leaders/advisors have a responsibility to follow animal health practices that are approved by the industry and the USDA to assure that the animal product customers are receiving is safe and wholesome food.

<u>Substance Policy.</u> Any drug, antibiotic or substance which may have been administered by the exhibitor or any other person must be done in strict compliance with the manufacturer's label requirements. The use of any tranquilizer or other non-approved substance, or the improper use of approved substances is strictly prohibited. All youth livestock exhibits must meet health and other project requirements, rules, and regulations. Any exhibitor who violates any rule or regulation will forfeit all privileges and premiums and be subject to such penalty, up to and including immediate dismissal from the Fair. Animals that have not met these standards will

be the responsibility of the seller and will not be covered by the Owyhee County Junior Livestock insurance program.

Basic Health Requirements. To exhibit ANY livestock at the Owyhee County Fair:

- 1. Animals must be sound, in good health, and free of any communicable diseases or parasites. All animals are subject to inspection at the fairgrounds.
- 2. Livestock or poultry of any age or class showing clinical evidence of disease and/or parasites shall not be permitted to enter the fairgrounds. Any animal or fowl developing clinical evidence of disease after entering the fairgrounds may not show, and shall be subject to isolation or expulsion, depending on the nature and seriousness of the disease. In either case, the decision of the species superintendent and Extension personnel will prevail.
- 3. Any animal with stitches present or that exhibits a prolapse during the Owyhee County Fair will be ineligible for exhibit or sale and, upon notification by Extension personnel and the Superintendent, be immediately removed from the fairgrounds.
- 4. Out of state animals shall meet all requirements for entry into the state as established by the Idaho Department of Agriculture of Animal Health.
- 5. With the exception of meat goats and pygmy goats, no animal with horns will be shown. Horns must be tipped or covered at all times while on the grounds.
- 6. The owner of the animal is responsible for all veterinary calls and treatment for their animal.

Specific Health Requirements.

- 1. <u>Horses.</u> Horses must be vaccinated for 4Way and Rhino. Evidence must be provided to club leader that these vaccinations were done within 90 days prior to Fair, but no earlier than May 15. It is strongly recommended that horses be vaccinated for West Nile Virus, and that the Coggins Test for EIA be administered.
- Cattle. Female breeding animals older than 4 months of age must be inoculated for Brucellosis (Bangs). It is strongly recommended that breeding cattle be vaccinated 1 month before the Fair for IBR, BVD, BRSV, Lepto, Pl-3 and Red Water.
- 3. <u>Swine</u>. It is strongly recommended that breeding swine be vaccinated for Erysipelas 15 days before the Fair. It is also recommended that all breeding animals returned home be kept isolated from the rest of the herd for a period of 30 days. Additional requirements for all swine may be mandated by the Idaho State Veterinarian.
- 4. <u>Goats.</u> All female goats will be checked for Scrapies tags at check-in/weigh-in and that tag number will be recorded. Those without a Scrapies will not be able to participate in the show or sale. ADGA registered tattoos can be used. Those with microchipped goats must provide the reader. All goats in milk MUST be milked at least once per day into a pail or bucket. No milking directly onto the ground. Over uddering will not be tolerated. At the Superintendent's discretion, exhibitors will be asked to relieve any dairy goat that is over uddered. No dairy goats with horns are allowed.
- 5. Sheep. Sheep shall be free from any evidence of Foot Rot, Blue Tongue, and Lip and Leg Ulcer. All female sheep will be checked for Scrapies tags at check-in/weigh-in and that tag number will be recorded. Those without a Scrapies tag will not be allowed to participate in the show or sale. Idaho State 4-H Policies and Procedures Guidelines endorses the American Veterinary Medical Association recommendation that all lambs should be docked no shorter than the distal end of the caudal fold.

Safety.

- 1. All animals must be under the control of and shown by the Exhibitor.
- 2. For safety and as a courtesy towards other exhibitors, animals that get loose two times and disrupt the class in the show ring will be dismissed from the show ring and receive a white ribbon.
- 3. Uncontrollable animals will be removed from the fairgrounds.
- 4. Upon consultation with the leaders, parents, and Extension personnel, the Superintendent has the authority to deem an animal unsafe to show. The Superintendent will provide a written explanation of his/her ruling.

Junior Livestock Auction Rules

Auction Rules.


- 1. 4-H and FFA members may sell one animal (beef, sheep, swine, or market goat) at the Junior Livestock Sale, and are required to be present at the sale. Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion animals must sell at the Junior Livestock Sale. In the unlikely event that an exhibitor showing two market projects should win Grand and/or Reserve Champion in both species, then the exhibitor may choose which animal they wish to sell.
- 2. The Junior Livestock Sale is for Owyhee County exhibitors only. 4-H and FFA members carrying projects in other counties as well as Owyhee County will be allowed to sell a market animal at only one Fair.
- 3. An adequate sale commission, not to exceed 4% for sheep, swine, and goat; and 3% for beef, to cover sale expenses and market animal death insurance will be deducted from the total sale price and add-ons of each animal sold.
- 4. Exhibitors MUST check out with their Superintendent during the 8:00-10:00 p.m. check out time or make prior arrangements with the Superintendent. A \$100 fee will be assessed to those who do not leave their pen properly cleaned and/or check out with their Superintendent. No pen cleaning until after load out on Sunday morning.
- 5. Ownership of animals transfers immediately following the sale of the animal. Final destination of each animal is at the sole discretion of the buyer. Disputes involving live animals must be brought to the attention of the Sale Committee immediately following the sale. In the event a dispute or issue should arise the resolution will be determined by the Sale Committee and is final.
- 6. Sellers shall be responsible for feeding and watering their animal until it is removed from the fairgrounds. After the sale, buyers of self-haul animals must check out with the Superintendent prior to leaving the fairgrounds.
- 7. Animals receiving blue, red and white quality awards will be allowed to sell at auction.
- 8. Those animals not receiving floor bid will be sold at auction without a floor.
- 9. All animals will be sold at the judges' discretion.
- 10. ONLY animals meeting minimum weight requirements will be sold. Animals may be weighed as long as the scales are open. Only the scale at the fairgrounds will be used for final weights at Fair. No animals will be re-weighed after leaving the scale area.
- 11. <u>Extra Animals</u> Ear tags will be removed from extra animals at weigh in. These animals are to be removed from the grounds by 10:00 am on Wednesday unless special arrangements are made with the Superintendent.
- 12. <u>Underweight Animals</u> Ear tags on animals that are underweight will be changed at weigh in. These animals may stay on the grounds to participate in showmanship and feeder classes; however, they are required to be removed from the grounds Friday between 8:00 and 10:00 p.m. Those living a great distance from the fairgrounds may keep their underweight animal at the fairgrounds as long as they make arrangements with their Superintendent for check out and are removed before load out begins early Sunday morning. NO underweight animals can be on the fairgrounds Sunday morning when sale animals are sorted for delivery to packers. A completed Check Out Form is required to remove an animal from the grounds. These forms are available from your Superintendent and need to be signed by the animal owner and species Superintendent.
- 13. NO ANIMALS WILL BE RECEIVED BETWEEN 11:00 PM TUESDAY AND 6:00 AM ON WEDNESDAY.
- 14. <u>Swine</u> All swine must be weighed and in place by 10:00 am on Wednesday. This weight will be used as the sale weight (see rule 10). Swine may be checked in between 7:00 pm and 11:00 pm on Tuesday and beginning at 6:00 am on Wednesday.
- 15. <u>Sheep and Goats</u> Sheep and Goats must be weighed and in place by 8:00 pm on Tuesday. No halters or collars of any kind may be worn on the scale. This weight will be used as the sale weight. Goats must be born after January 1, must weigh a minimum of 65 lbs. <u>and</u> must have an ADG of at least 0.3lbs. during the feeding period at final weigh-in (see rule 10).
- 16. Sheep Sheep must be slick-shorn within 7 days prior to the final weigh-in at Fair (see rule 10).
- 17. Beef Beef animals will be weighed at designated times and locations. (see rule 10)
- 18. Livestock Sale Procedure:
 - a. The Sale Committee will set a per head floor price for each specie based on the packer's carcass bid, estimated grade, yield, and dressing percent.
 - b. Buyers will pay full sale price for non-re-sale and the difference between floor price and bid price for re-sale animals.

- c. Kill charges will be paid by the buyer.
- d. Should any carcass be condemned, members will receive the amount of original live value at the time of initial weigh-in.
- e. Monies received from the sale on Owyhee Cattlemen's Association sponsored steers will be divided 2/3 to the youth and 1/3 to the OCA member who sponsored the steer.
- 19. <u>Order of Sale</u> Grand and Reserve Grand Champion quality will sell first and second, followed by all blue ribbon, then red ribbon, then white ribbon animals.
- 20. <u>Buyer Certificates</u> Buyer certificates will be available from the Extension Office upon request, and available on the Extension website. Youth must provide their own photo. It is optional for individuals or clubs to provide frames for the certificates. Youth are responsible to deliver their thank you and buyer certificate to the buyer after the auction.
- 21. <u>During the Sale</u> To keep the sale moving in a timely manner and to allow buyers to concentrate on the sale, no buyer gifts may be brought into the sale ring or distributed during the auction. Only ribbons and awards associated with the market animal project are allowed in the sale ring.
- 22. All sales and shipping arrangements for market animals not going through the official Junior Livestock Sale Auction are the responsibility of the owner. The Junior Livestock Sale Committee cannot make personal sale or shipping arrangements.
- 23. <u>Payment Checks</u> will be prepared and ready to mail as soon as funds are received to cover them, typically at the end of September. Please DO NOT CALL before that time. Any check that needs to be reissued will be charged a \$50 fee.
- 24. <u>Self-Insurance</u> Rates for payment of youth whose animal dies will be set each spring by the Livestock Sale Committee after reviewing the current market.



Beef Carcass Quality Award

The Beef Carcass Quality Award is offered as an incentive for members to select top quality cattle that have growth potential, exhibit good muscling and trimness, and are structurally correct. It also encourages proper management in the care and feeding of the selected animal to achieve high levels of production. In this way the Beef Carcass Quality Award provides a "real world" industry view of beef production.

The award is based on the "Standards of Excellence" set and followed within the industry and emphasizes that the consumer must be satisfied with the finished product.

Market Standards of Excellence:

- 1. USDA Quality grade of Choice minus, or better.
- 2. Hot Carcass Weight of 550 to 950 lb.
- 3. Minimum 57% dressed on straight live weight.
- 4. Minimum Average Daily Gain of 2.8.
- 5. Maximum USDA Yield Grade of 3.20.
- ➤ Gold Standard Certificates are awarded to members whose steers meet all five industry standards. Gold Standard animals will be eligible for production award monies.
- Silver Standard Certificates are awarded to members whose steers meet four industry standards.
- White Standard Certificates are awarded to members whose steers meet three or less industry standards.

Dog Show Rules

- 1. All dogs will be brought in and taken home the day of the show. Dogs must be on a leash or crated and not left unattended.
- 2. All general and livestock rules apply to this department.
- 3. All obedience dogs must wear a properly fitted collar or training collar, being defined as either a flat collar or a slip collar of either chain or fabric with one ring at each end. A chain collar "choke" is permitted; however, a show lead and collar are preferred.
- 4. All members competing in obedience must use a 6-foot leather or fabric lead.
- 5. Obedience classes will be judged on the ability of the exhibitor to have their dog perform a series of exercises for each class. Classes may be combined at the discretion of the Judge or Superintendent.
- 6. Bitches in season must be reported to Superintendent and Judge and may be shown at the discretion of the judge.
- 7. The Judge must remove from competition any:
 - a. Dog that is not kept under control by its handler.
 - b. Handler who interferes willfully with another competitor or dog.
 - c. Handler who abuses dog in the ring.
- 8. If a dog or handler is expelled or excused by a judge, the reason shall be stated in the Judge's book or in a separate report.
- 9. Dogs must be current on recommended and/or required vaccinations.

Invitation Super Round Robin Showmanship Contests

Owyhee County is invited to enter the highest ranking Senior 4-H and/or FFA Small and Large Animal Round Robin winners to participate in the Super Round Robin Showmanship Contests at the Western Idaho Fair. If the Champion is unable or ineligible to attend, the Reserve Champion may compete, if they are eligible.

Large Animal Super Round Robin participants will show Beef, Sheep, Swine, Dairy Cattle, Dairy Goats, Market Goats, Llamas or Alpacas, and Horses. The contest will be held August 27th at 7:30 pm in Rings 1,2 & 3.

Small Animal Super Round Robin participants will show a Cat, Cavy, Dog, Bird, Pygmy Goat, and Rabbit. The contest will be held August 27th at 6pm in the Dairy Ring.

Previous winners of the Super Round Robin Contests are not eligible to compete. Buckles will be awarded for the Champion and Reserve Champion of both the Small and Large Animal Contests. The Owyhee County Extension Office will distribute additional information about registering and participating in the Super Round Robin Contests after Fair.

Herdsmanship

Herdsmanship, for both large and small animals, will be judged Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday. A cash award will be given to the club with the highest overall 3-day score for each of the large animals species and the small animals (judged separately). Daily winners in each species will be awarded candy. Judging will be based upon cleanliness, neatness, educational displays, decoration, and exhibitor attendance at stalls.

The purpose of this contest is to encourage exhibitors to care for their animals and equipment properly, to keep pens and stalls clean, and to present a pleasing and educational exhibit to the general public. The purpose of this contest is to encourage exhibitors to care for their animals and equipment properly, to keep pens and stalls clean, and to present a pleasing and educational exhibit to the general public.

Guidelines for Herdsmanship:

- Animals and pens are to be kept clean. Animals must have fresh water and feed whenever needed or on feeding schedule.
- Beef and Dairy animals should be tied correctly with a halter and a neck rope (Not neck chain. If an animal gets in trouble there is no way to cut a chain.)
- Wheelbarrows, brooms, rakes, shovels, and other equipment should be stored safely in equipment boxes and designated areas. Equipment and trash should be kept out of walkway.
- Small clubs/chapters (4 members or less) may join together for barn duty with other clubs in the same barn. Clubs/chapters need to inform barn superintendent of combinations.
- Educational material must be displayed. It is important as representatives of the livestock industry to help educate the general public to the importance and value of the livestock industry.
- Decorations are to be neat and attractive but need not be fancy or expensive.
- Exhibitors should be friendly and courteous to the public. They should be ready and willing to answer questions or discuss their project. When on duty, exhibitors should present a clean, neat appearance.
- Herdsmanship hours will be from 9:00 a.m. 6:00 p.m. each day. Members are excused from being judged for herdsmanship during their species' show times. At least one exhibitor from each club/chapter (no parents) should be on duty at all times during these hours.
- All projects and decorations are to be maintained and remain in place until 6:00 p.m. on Saturday.

Oral Presentations

All regularly enrolled members of an Owyhee County 4-H club may enter the Oral Presentation Contest by presenting a demonstration, illustrated talk, TV commercial, dramatic reading, or speech.

Each of these will receive ribbon awards (blue, red, or white). In addition, awards will be given to the top presenter in each age category at the Owyhee County Fair at the Awards Ceremony. The Oral Presentation Contest is held in June.

Cloverbuds

Ages 5-7, as of January 1st

<u>Cloverbud Guidelines.</u> The Idaho 4-H Cloverbud Program is offered for youth who are 5 -7 years old by January 1 of the current 4-H year.

<u>Participation.</u> Cloverbud members may be involved in non-animal, or lap animal activities. Lap animals are defined as: rabbits, cavies, cats, small dogs, chickens, and goats that weigh less than the member. Cloverbuds may not be involved in large animal projects, competitive situations, and projects involving firearms or motorized vehicles. 4-H insurance policies, including the University of Idaho liability coverage for volunteers, will not cover youth or adults working with youth under the age of 8. involved in these activities.

<u>County Oral Presentations.</u> Cloverbuds are welcomed and encouraged to participate in the County Oral Presentation Contest. Participation ribbons are awarded for their efforts as they begin to learn about public speaking and presentations.

<u>Cloverbud Exhibits at Fair.</u> Fair exhibits by Cloverbuds are non-competitive and are optional. Exhibits are an opportunity to show what they have accomplished. A Cloverbud may exhibit their Activity Book and/or activity at Fair but are not required to do so. A participation ribbon or similar recognition will be awarded.

Activity Book Interviews. If a Cloverbud would like to experience an oral interview and discuss their completed activity with a judge, they are welcome to do so. These interviews are held just prior to Fair. Cloverbuds will need to sign up for an interview time in the same manner as the older 4-H participants. After the interview they will leave their Activity Book with the judge, and it will be added to their club's display at Fair. A participation ribbon or similar recognition will be awarded.

<u>Fair Entries.</u> If your Cloverbud would like to exhibit their activity or activities at Fair, please submit their fair entries online in the same manner as the older 4-H and FFA members. The deadline for fair entries is July 15 at midnight.

Family & Consumer Science & Misc. Department

- 1. All Static (FCS and Miscellaneous) Project entries must be checked in between 3-8 pm on Tuesday. Entry checkout is from 6-8pm on Saturday.
- 2. Judging will be completed between 10:00 a.m. and 2:00 p.m. on Wednesday.
- 3. Exhibits, once assigned space, become subject to the control of the department superintendent.
- 4. 4-H FCS and Miscellaneous exhibits are to meet the 4-H minimum requirements as well as comply with the rules and regulations governing the Owyhee County Fair.
- 5. Any exhibitor who violates any of the rules and regulations will forfeit all privileges and be subject to such penalty as the management may assign.
- 6. Under no circumstances are project record books to be removed until checkout time.
- 7. All record books must be turned in at Record Book Interview Evaluations prior to Fair. 4-H superintendents will rely on the signatures of the 4-H leader and parents as a certification that the record book is complete, and the exhibit is ready to be judged. A project demonstration is also required per project that the youth exhibits. The 4-H member, leader and parent must sign all the record books. If the record book is not signed, the project will not be eligible for exhibit at the Fair. The involvement report and story are a required part of the 4-H exhibit along with the project book and record book.
- 8. 4-H Secretary's Book, Treasurer's Book and Club Scrapbook are to be exhibited in the appropriate class.
- 9. Guidelines for posters and displays are located in project requirements.
- 10. Preparation of clothing and sewn exhibits:
 - a. Garments that have been worn should be carefully laundered or cleaned and pressed before exhibiting.
 - b. All sewn projects, including quilts, are to be brought on hangers (supplied by the member).
 - c. Only accessories made to complete project requirements are to be exhibited in any department of the clothing project.

11. Preparation of foods exhibits:

- a. Food exhibited should be placed on a <u>disposable</u> plate and covered with a new clear plastic zip lock bag. NO PLASTIC WRAP!
- b. Recipes and their source MUST be included with food items (Exception: cake decorating).
- c. Canning exhibits should also include contents of the jar, method of canning (boiling water bath or pressure), style of pack (raw pack or hot pack), altitude food was processed at (elevation) and processing time on a label attached to the bottom of the jar. All tomato products must have the addition of acid (lemon juice, citric acid, or vinegar) to be considered a safe product. If you have questions, contact the Owyhee County Extension office and ask for the FCS Extension Educator.
- 12. Displays and exhibits must meet project requirements.

<u>Style Revue Contest.</u> All 4-H members having entered completed clothing projects are encouraged to enter the Style Revue contest. A contestant may model only one outfit unless they have completed two 4-H clothing projects. Members may model in both 4-H Clothing Construction and Select & Show. Clothing Construction Department Eligibility criteria is as follows:

- 1. Participants must be enrolled in a 4-H clothing project.
- 2. Participants must attend the Style Revue rehearsal.

Select and Show Department: For youth, ages 3 and up who are not in a sewing project and would like to model in the Owyhee County Fair Show. Eligibility criteria is as follows:

- 1. Participants select an outfit to model. (Members do not have to sew to enter this Department.) Outfit could be a school outfit, sport outfit, or special occasion outfit.
- 2. Participants in the Select and Show Department must attend rehearsal.
